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INSIGHT FROM THE CAMPUS MINISTER

A Long, Loving Look at the Real

We live near York River State Park, and I go there almost every day. I know all the trails, and could probably run them with my eyes closed (ok – not really!) But recently, I had my eyes opened to the miracle of that beautiful place. I was walking with my wife, Allison, around the pond when we heard a flood of noise coming from the woods ahead of us. It sounded like a flock of giant angry crows, but more awkward and intense. We rounded the corner on the trail and saw a tall pine tree filled with nesting blue herons. Dozens of heron chicks were standing in big shaggy nests waiting for their parents to return with food, and each time a heron flew into a nest, every baby heron in the tree would erupt in cries.

We stood and watched for an hour, counting at least five nests, each with three or four young. It was amazing. Then Allison came back the next day with our boys. And each time I went running over the following week, I stopped to watch the elegant blue herons fly in and out of their nests high up over the forest floor. I watched them feed their chicks and then soar back out over the still waters of the York River to fish again. Each time I saw them, I felt I had been given this lovely gift of a glimpse of the beauty of this world, of new life coming into being before my eyes. And I was lucky just to be there, just to get to see it.

There is a brilliant book by Jenny Odell called How to Do Nothing: Resisting the Attention Economy. Odell is an artist and teacher, and in her book she reflects on how our human world has been constructed to demand shallow attention and distraction from us. It is literally how much of our economy functions—our distraction is worth a lot of money to advertisers. But early in the book, Odell writes beautifully about how she learned about attention from bird watching:

Observing birds requires you literally to do nothing. Bird-watching is the opposite of looking something up online. You can't really look for birds; you can't make a bird come out and identify itself to you. The most you can do is walk quietly and wait until you hear something, and then stand motionless under a tree, using your animal senses to figure out where and what it is.

What I find lovely in her description is the do nothing part. There is a sense that what the work of bird-watching is the waiting. It is the commitment to paying attention. There is a story about Simone Weil, a French philosopher who died in 1943. Weil was a brilliant young thinker and writer who, in her late twenties, began to have intense religious experiences of Christ. As she learned to pray, she would say the "Our Father" very slowly to herself. She tried to say each word slowly and with full presence. If she found her mind drifting off, she would return to the beginning and start again.

Now, I have tried this myself, and I have never ONCE completed it. I might get to heaven or even hallowed, and that's about it. More usually its Father, and then back again to the start. I am aware that I am as distracted and anxious as anyone. But I am so curious about that practice—the

work of attention because attention opens up the world for us. I find myself longing for that experience, even though it is difficult and tiring, even though whenever I practice it, I immediately find how incapable I am of real attention!

One of the best definitions of prayer I have ever heard comes from a short article by the Jesuit theologian Walter Burghardt. He writes about "contemplation" – the Christian prayer that is really a practice



of attentive presence. He says this kind of prayer is best understood as a "long, loving look at the real." This can be a really helpful structure to think about how to pray. Burghardt says: "Each word is crucial: real... look... long... loving." We pay attention to our real world, the community around us. We take the time and we look with love – and if we do, we will encounter God.

How we returned to see the beautiful blue herons over those weeks was a kind of prayer. For me, this is also a powerful way to think about an academic year at Walsingham. I tell my friends who are not teachers that the sacred gift of the school year is that we have nine months to pay real attention to the beauty of God's children. We have the chance to see God's love come into being in the lives of our young people. Sometimes it erupts into clear, visible glory—we see a child's artwork, or some dynamic academic growth, or success in sports, or on stage. More often, it is in the daily attention and practice of learning, love, friendship, and forgiveness. There are the spiritual practices of a community that is looking for the presence of God. It is not easy, and often we fail, but that is all part of the work, the long and loving work we get to do together.

The spring musical this year, Oklahoma, was a huge hit! The large crowds were awed by multiple incredible dance scenes that included the entire cast of almost 40 students. All of them danced on stage in unison; it was quite a sight to behold. The cast members ranged from third through twelfth grade and that is what makes Walsingham Theatre unique according to Jeff Nicoloff, the director of the show. "The range of age we incorporate in our theatre program is something different from other programs, and we feel it adds to the quality of the production. It also allows the younger students to be inspired and mentored by the older cast members," he said humbly after the shows concluded. Many other cast members had similar interpretations of their sustained success. Emma Shellman, a junior who has been in many productions, had this to say, "This show was unique because there were a lot more characters. I could see the growth and development and how much the younger ones learned." For Josh Powell, a sophomore student, and a crew and cast member, it was an opportunity to push himself out of his comfort zone. He said, "I enjoy the technical side of things and was taught by an older student about all the crew's responsibilities when I was younger. Being a part of

the cast for the first time was really fulfilling and exciting!"

Oklahoma was an absolutely fantastic show and according to Mr. Nicoloff, it was the most successful show yet for Walsingham Theatre. Each of the three performances had over 1,000 in attendance. Each audience was engaged with many moments of laughter and loud applause. There were over 1000 people in total who were thoroughly entertained by numbers such as "Oh What a Beautiful Morning" and "Kansas City."

James Wang, an eighth grader who played the character

Will Parker said, "It was fun having a group of friends that you could rely on and share your interest." For Velina Morales, a Walsingham seventh grader, this musical was particularly "high-spirited and really upbeat." She also added, "I loved the Dream Sequence because each part was different. It was so fun to do completely different things in one sequence."

From the youngest cast member's perspective, when asked what he learned from his older cast members, Weston VandeSand, a third grader mentioned, "They taught me how to act and socialize in an ensemble and that is such a big deal." He named Maks Sekula and Noah Rodriguez as the two who encouraged and taught him the most as mentors for this performance. VandeSand added that he would "definitely" be in more shows after this experience and that "it really made me happy and put a smile on my face."

Having the exposure and opportunity to be involved in theatre at such a young age is essential to developing new talent, and it would seem to be a substantial piece of Walsingham Theatre's tradition of success. Having passionate and caring mentors to inspire and teach the next generation of talented actors, dancers, and singers is what keeps producing extraordinary shows for Walsingham Theatre, like Oklahoma.



Her parents, Albert and Beatrice, are missionaries and worked in ministry at an orphanage in Ukraine where Tehinnah volunteered often. She and her family frequently volunteered at senior living establishments as well. When the war in Ukraine began, her family moved to Germany to pursue similar missionary work as her dad is a pastor. They all decided the best move for Tehinnah would be to move back to the United States to finish her schooling and senior year in English. They have family friends in Williamsburg and know some Walsingham families so the decision was easy for them. For Tehinnah, the transition to Walsingham was easy. "I love the community and the teachers are so kind, Mrs. Broderick for example, she will really work with you when you need it, and that kind of care and having great teachers really helped me transition quickly," she said.

The experiences overseas with her family and her faith have had a profound effect on her life and shaped who she is today. She reflected on her time spent in ministry and watching her parents, "my parents ministry called me to help. It inspired me to think of others first and use my skills to help them. Working with them in ministry taught me

the values of service, community, education, faith, and just the importance of living a life listening to God." Doing just that, listening and praying, is what led her to choose her college. "Lots of prayers let me to Davidson College," she said. Tehinnah is super excited to start her college experience at Davidson and plans to major in Political Science with potential plans of Law School following. The skills and gifts she possesses have touched many lives.

As part of the annual Bon Secours College of Nursing Global Outreach Auction, Kate helped raise money for medical supplies for mission trips to Haiti for nursing students.

This fall, Kate is attending the University of Mississippi. Here, she will be enrolled in the honors college, majoring in psychology, specializing in neuroscience on the pre-med track. After college she plans to attend medical school with a goal of becoming a medical physician.

Q. What will you miss most about Walsingham?

A. I will miss most the close community of friends I have made at Walsingham. I have such fond memories because of them, and being at Walsingham allowed me to make these amazing friendships.

Q. What has been your favorite memory of your time at Walsingham Academy?


Q. Do you have a favorite quote? Why does this quote resonate with you?

Q. If you could give underclassmen one piece of advice what would that be? And why?



Q&A with Billy Barnes

Billy Barnes '14 attended Walsingham Academy from Kindergarten to 12th grade. Coming from a "basketball family," it was no surprise that Billy joined the team in 6th grade. During his Trojan basketball career, he was a 1,000-point scorer and named to the All-TCIS and All-State teams both his junior and senior year. In 2014, Billy received the Eloise Jacobs award and the Catherine McAuley Service Award, which is awarded to students who have distinguished themselves by living the virtue of charity



that was ever-present in Sisters of Mercy foundress Catherine McAuley's life and work.

After graduating from Walsingham, Billy attended The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. He graduated in 2018 summa cum laude with a degree in International Economics and Finance. He began his career with a technology startup in Northern Virginia and ultimately became the Director of Sales for the company. Subsequently, he moved back to Williamsburg and transitioned into the wealth management industry, where these days you will find him as a Financial Advisor for the Barnes Investment Consulting Group of Wells Fargo Advisors. Billy says, "I have always been interested in a career working with people and believe strongly in the principle that 'Business is a force for good'. In my role now, I get to put that principle into action by helping businesses and families achieve favorable financial outcomes that help them build wealth, support loved ones, and serve their communities through business and philanthropy."

Billy has remained an active member of the Walsingham community sponsoring fundraising event, like the Annual Golf Tournament and serving as the assistant coach for the boys' basketball team during the '21–'22 season, which coincided with his father's 29th and final year as the head coach. Billy says, "It was a special opportunity to be able to coach with him before he retired, and I really enjoyed getting to know the players."

Q. Tell us about a favorite Walsingham memory.

A. So many good ones from which to choose ... back-to-back appearances in the state final four, Senior Night with my teammates, scoring 1,000 points the same week that my sister Ashley reached this milestone on the girls' team, the Jimmy Buffet concert with friends, and enjoying all the Walsingham traditions.

Q. During your years as a student at Walsingham Academy, did you have a teacher or mentor who was particularly inspiring to you?

A. Again it is hard to name just one...Mr. Delaney and Mr. Fitzpatrick were incredible role models. Mr. Zanca and Mrs. Hylton were great teachers and made class something to look forward to. All of my basketball coaches - my dad, Coach Dwyer, Coach Lowenhaupt, and Coach McCary, - are great mentors to me still today.

Q. What lessons from your time as a student at Walsingham Academy do you still carry with you in your career?

A. The idea of living life with a strong emphasis on service to others is something that sticks with me from my time at Walsingham. It seems to me that the most fulfilling and fruitful careers tend to be rooted in a mission to serve others, so I carry that idea with me and keep it front and center in my own career.

Q. If you could give current Walsingham Academy students a piece of advice, what would it be?

A. I think one of the biggest factors on your happiness going through high school, college, and beyond is your attitude and outlook. Things are never going to be perfect, but if you adopt the approach that you are going to make the best out of any situation, I believe you will find that problems that seem big become small and things that seem boring become fun. All you had to do was change the way you look at them.

Q. Is there anything else that you would like to share with our Walsingham Academy community?

A. I want to say thank you to all the parents, coaches, teachers, friends, and families that helped to form the Walsingham community. So many people together played a role in creating a great environment for my classmates and me. I hope to pay them tribute by doing as they did and always standing by to help any current students and families navigating the trials and tribulations of high school and college. 

Our student-athletes perseverance and grit are second to none and is highlighted in their impressive seasons.















FALL 2022

Our fall sports really started off a great year in athletics! Both the Varsity Boys' Cross Country Team and the Varsity Boys' Soccer team were crowned state champions for the first time! Our Boys' Cross Country had a very impressive season. Head Coach Rich Higgins rejoined the program this year. Led by senior and TCIS Player of the Year, Jake Falcone '23, the team competed in the TCIS well, often in back and forth runs with Peninsula Catholic. For the girls' Shea Mansisidor '27 was named 1st Team All-TCIS! However, at the end of the season, in the biggest State Meet yet, our Boys' Cross Country team placed many top finishers which gave them the title of State Champions! Jake Falcone '23, Brody Cox '25, Parker Shonka '23, Nick Primich '25, Andrew Robinson '25, and Brendan Bouchard '23 were all named All-State! This is a first for Walsingham Boys' Cross Country. Varsity Girls' Cross Country was small in numbers but continued to compete throughout the season.

Similarly, our Varsity Boys' Soccer team persevered through a competitive season. Led by Head Coach Brendan Cook, the team finished the season 12-9-1. Highlights included a close win over Nansemond-Suffolk, a second-chance win against Banner Christian, and of course the thrilling State Championship game win over Wakefield, 3-2! Ethan Hayes '23 was named VISAA DIII Player of the Year and was elected 1st Team All-TCIS! Cooper Bailey '24 and Keith Cardenas '23 were named 1st Team All-State and 2nd Team All-TCIS. Will Patterson '24 was named 2nd Team All-State and Coach Brendan Cook was the State Coach of the Year!

Varsity Field Hockey continued their success from previous years and finished the season 14-6-1 under Head Coach Emily Mauk. Highlights from the season included starting the season off with a Mercy Rule win over Covenant and a 3-2 win over Jamestown the day before school started, beating rival HRA twice, and winning against all Williamsburg public schools including a tight game versus Lafayette in the Under the Lights Game at William and Mary. The Trojans made it to the State final four games again this year and will look to make it to the finals this upcoming fall. Noelle Kokolis '24 was named 1st Team All-State and 1st Team All-TCIS and Beatrice Ehrhardt '23 and Hailey Diggs '24 were named 1st Team All-State and 2nd Team All-TCIS. Kokolis, Ehrhardt, and Diggs were also named to the 2022 NFHCA High School National Academic Squad.

The Varsity Girls' Tennis team had another good year under Head Coach Erik Wright! Highlights included a 9-0 win over Peninsula Catholic, close 5-4 wins over Norfolk Christian and Catholic, and a 6-3 win over Steward. Jordan Thomas '24 won topflight singles at the TCIS Championship and was named 1st Team All-TCIS! Thomas and Isabella Kennedy '24 were also named 2nd Team All-TCIS in doubles. Varsity Volleyball continued the Walsingham tradition of sportsmanship this season. A rather young team, led by Ione senior Kennedy Saumier '23, the team bonded and gained a great amount of knowledge from Coach Sara Dowell.

Our fall sports teams continue to expand. Most of our JJV and JV teams were at maximum capacity. Without a doubt, these teams continued the Walsingham tradition of excellence while striving to learn fundamentals and compete. JV Boys' Soccer had a good season and many of the talented players will move up to the varsity team this upcoming year in hopes to defend the state title. For the first year in a long time, we had a JV Field Hockey team. This team was mostly 7th graders who proved that they can compete at a higher level with a huge win over St. Catherine's. JV Girls' Tennis added a major win over Nansemond-Suffolk Academy. JJV Boys' Soccer, JJV Field Hockey, and JJV Volleyball all kept large teams of 5th through 7th graders who often competed against teams of all 8th graders. These Trojans learned the fundamentals of their sports and will dominate when it is their turn to compete at the varsity level.

ATHLETICS UPDATE

WINTER 2022-2023

The State Championships kept coming in the Winter for the Trojans when the Varsity Girls' Basketball team earned the title for the first time since 2008! The Varsity Girls' Basketball team had 11 girls, six of whom where eighth graders. They finished the season 15-10 with impressive wins over Norfolk Academy and Cape Henry. Keira Kilkenny '27 was named State Player of the Year and voted on the 1st Team All-TCIS as well as led the TCIS in scoring and added the records for points and steals in a game. Noelle Kokolis '24 was named 1st Team All-State and 2nd Team All-TCIS. Head Coach Emily Mauk was named Coach of the Year.

The Varsity Boys' Basketball team finished 16-15 and made it to the state quarterfinals. This was the first season without longtime Head Coach Billy Barnes as Athletic Director Neil Bailey stepped in for a season to coach the team after Barnes' retirement. Their season was highlighted with Paul Williams '23 scoring over 1,000 points in his career and included close wins over Nansemond-Suffolk Academy and Christchurch. Newcomer Bryce Watlington '24was the TCIS leading scorer and was named 1st Team All-State and 1st Team All TCIS. Williams was named 2nd Team All-TCIS.

Varsity Swimming had an outstanding year. Joined by many talented swimmers from the eighth grade class, the swim team had 19 student-athletes qualify for the state meet. The swim team is applauded for their willpower to wake up early in the morning and get their swim in before the school day begins. The Trojans hosted two meets this year at the 757 Aquatic Center. The team is full of potential and definitely one you want to keep your eye on next winter.

Trojan JV and JJV basketball teams kept the same hard work mentality of our varsity teams. The JV basketball team was led by Head Coach Bill Gerry and the team really progressed through the season. JJV boys' and girls' basketball worked on fundamentals and their basketball knowledge throughout the season to improve every step of the way. The JJV basketball teams were the highlight of Lower School Spirit Night where both teams walked away with a win!

SPRING 2023

Varsity Baseball had another successful season under Head Coach Ian Heisel. The team won their 5th straight state championship and finished the season 22-10. The season began with injuries to two of their starters, but other teammates stepped up and the Trojans continue to be domiant. The Trojans made it to the semifinals of the TCIS tournament. Luke Harlow '24 and Brody Schultz '24 were named 1st Team All-TCIS and Joey Masiak '23, Ryan Terrell '23, and Will Wyles '24 were named 2nd Team All-TCIS. In the state tournament, Coach Ian Heisel was named Coach of the year and Luke Harlow '24 was named Player of the Year. Joey Masiak '23, Brody Schultz '24, Sean Sousa '24, and Will Wyles '24 were named 1st Team All-State. Trey Christman '23, Daniel Guntherberg '25, and Davis Neighbor '24 were named 2nd Team All-State!

Varsity Golf keeps gaining in popularity. Head Coach Chris Smurthwaite kept two teams this year, an A team and a B team. This season included great wins over Summit, Christchurch, and Norfolk Christian. The team was led by seven seniors! Varsity girls' soccer had a promising year. They found their groove right after Spring Break with wins over Nansemond-Suffolk Academy, Peninsula Catholic, and Catholic High School. The end of their season was plagued by injuries. Shea Mansisidor '27 was named 1st Team All-TCIS and Hailey Diggs '24 was named 2nd Team All-TCIS. A group of very promising underclassmen are moving up next year as they will be 8th graders. The JJV Girls' Soccer team had a fantastic season this year. Not only did the team learn fundamentals of soccer, but they were extremely competitive against other teams!

Varsity Track and Field had another good season. Walsingham hosted a great meet with a dozen teams in attendance as well as a smaller JV meet later in the spring. Q&A with Corey Brown



Transferring to Walsingham Academy during the middle of high school, Corey Brown, Class of 2012, was an outstanding student-athlete and leader on and off the court. He was the co-editor of the yearbook staff his senior year, a chorus member for one year, ran track for three years and was the team captain, and played on the varsity basketball team for four years, his true passion. Corey was the team captain for three years, won First Team All TCIS, First Team All-State for three straight years, and was the Daily Press All Area First Team Member in 2011. BA true Trojan legend, Corey still

holds the records in all time rebounds, assists, and steals.

Corey went on to play basketball at Randolph College in Lynchburg, VA. During his college career, he was part of the school's first-ever DIV. III NCAA tournament team and ranked in the top 25 nationally. In 2016, he was named to the All ODAC Tournament team. By the end of his college career, he was the school leader in charges and tied for most games played. Corey graduated from Randolph College in 2016 with a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology.

Corey now resides in Wilmington, NC where he has been working in higher education for six years. This is his first year working as a CAP (College Accelerated Program) Liaison for Pender County. Here, Corey guides a cohort of high school students through a fast-track dual enrollment program to help them attain their associates degree by the time they graduate high school. Corey says, "I enjoy giving back to youth and helping them discover more options when it comes to their futures. Allowing students to connect and use me as an outlet to explore their education and career goals in incredibly fulfilling."

This past February, Corey was inducted in the Walsingham Academy Athletic Hall of Fame for his achievements in basketball. These days, you might see Corey at a Walsingham sporting event when in town for a visit or wearing "some fresh Trojan gear to rep around town". On June 22, 2023, Corey married Jessica Sanabria with their daughter by their side! Congratulations, Jessica and Corey!







Q. What was one thing that Walsingham prepared you for with college and sports at the college level?

A. Walsingham was huge in me getting out of my comfort zone. I transferred from a public school in the middle of high school. I was forced to adjust to a new environment, which helped me in the long run because I didn't fear the change of environment going to college. Learning to be proactive inside and outside the classroom was also a useful tool I learned very quickly. With basketball, I was also coming into a completely new style of play and higher level of competition. Playing for a coach, who pushed me toward the level I was trying to reach was a huge plus.

Q. While here at Walsingham Academy, did you have a teacher or mentor who was particularly inspiring to you?

A. I had a few people who inspired me to be better. My coach, Billy Barnes had the biggest impact on me as we got to build a relationship for four years. I learned a lot from him on and off the court. Mrs. Eanes was my English teacher for one year, and not only was she an excellent teacher of the subject, she was also a life teacher. She continually pushed me to be the best I could be and cared about my growth as a student and person. Mr. Delaney was always really positive, and I really appreciated his ability to communicate with not only me, but so many of us. He was pivotal in volunteer work opportunities that were eye-opening opportunities.

Q. How did your experience as a student-athlete influence who you are today?

A. My athletic career at Walsingham taught me a lot about getting outside of my comfort zone, and also about what effect a leader can have. My roles changed a few times while a member of athletics, so I had to adjust depending on what was being asked of me. That taught me to look at the importance of my role in relation to the bigger picture. But also to understand that roles can change and/or be added to on the fly and you just have to adjust as best as you can moving forward.

Q. What is the best piece of advice you can share with a Walsingham Academy student-athlete?

A. First, I would say have fun with your experience. The years will fly by, and you can't get them back. The days you don't quite feel like doing as much or going to practice are the hardest, but truly these are the days to cherish the most. These are the days that tend to make us forget how much we will miss it. Make the most of your time. To this day, I still cherish my athletic high school career.

Q. Is there anything else that you would like to share with our Walsingham Academy community?

A. Before I graduated, I told someone that I wish I would have transferred to Walsingham a little sooner. I had a lot of fun growing as a person, student, and athlete. I met lot of people that made a difference in my experience, and I have always appreciated that. There were so many people I met along the way and lasting relationships I will never forget. For the people and time at Walsingham, I am forever grateful. Walsingham will always be home.



he was a big reason


we won the VISAA State Championship for the first time in Walsingham history."

Giles Ryan recently walked across the Basque Country in France and Spain. Along the way, Giles wrote some of his thoughts on the country as he was passing through.

Here is a writing of his recent experience titled Again, the Kingdom of Navarre:

I walked this way ten years ago but could not go the way I wished, the higher road, Napoleon's Pass, because it was still blocked by snow that late April day and the only way open was the Valcarlos path, Charlemagne's way across the Pyrenees, the safe way, and I had not come in search of safety. In that moment it was a disappointment and this has rankled, unreasonably, all these years but now I mean to make it right.

In those following years, I walked to Santiago twice again but started at different places, not in Saint Jean Pied de Port, the ancient town which marks the last stop in France before the path continues on the other side of the Pyrenees and across into Spain. This small town is lovely, picturesque and somewhat remote, inland from the Biscay coast, in the foothills of the mountains. Many thousands of people come here each year and most, I believe, stay but one night, then leave the next morning early and on foot and heading decidedly uphill, hoping to make good time over the mountains and on to Roncevalles, walking eight or nine hours, depending on their pace and stride and perhaps depending on their age. I may be the oldest this day, but I like to think I won't be the last arriving there.

But a morning start means arriving the day before, so the restaurants and cafés do a brisk trade in the evening, and the air is filled with a sense of anticipation and, perhaps for some, a measure of unease for the challenge ahead. It is, after all, a notable thing to cross over a mountain range on foot, and no less remarkable for having done so before. But setting aside any apprehension and distracting myself with more interesting thoughts, I consider that I'm not only crossing a mountain range, I'm also crossing from one country to another, from France into Spain, and even more notable, I'm crossing the Basque Country, a nation manqué, a land which, long ago, contained another dominion, the Kingdom of Navarre, a dominion lost in time.

History speaks of many kingdoms, empires and principalities, but most disappeared long ago and only a few of these linger today in some vestigial form in Spain, Britain, Denmark, the Netherlands, Japan and a few others. These are quaint aberrations, for the most part harmless, which cannot always be said of today's royal persons, whose antics sometimes make us wonder why they stubbornly hang on.

When some ancient kingdoms passed into myth they took with them the beliefs

and customs linked to their kingships. Kings, in the common imagination, were almost mystical creatures, and even just a few hundred years ago, within the well documented past, there was the persistent belief that the touch of a royal hand could cure an illness. As a little boy in 1712, Samuel Johnson was touched by Queen Anne and this, he said, cured his severe case of scrofula. He certainly believed this and for the rest of his life was a firm Tory and devout Church of England man. And he always wore around his neck the small gold coin English monarchs customarily gave to persons they touched and cured; (we can see Johnson's coin today at the British Museum.) Similarly, the kings of France, right up to the last one, King Louis XVI, performed the same ritual touch to cure illness, and the King would also touch the abdomens of pregnant Frenchwomen to ensure the mother's health and safe birth of her child, and the most experienced French midwives firmly held this belief. Who could doubt it?

These stray thoughts cross my mind as I cross these hills — real enough terrain, nothing mystical here underfoot — on my way across the Kingdom of Navarre. Today, most people know little about it, but up to the seventeenth century it was, as we now say, a thing. There were kings in this land between France and Spain, straddling the Pyrenees, and there were queens and princes, too. And now and then there might be a princess who could be married off to the king's advantage, for, as the world knows, dynastic politics did not allow for romantic notions.

Which brings us to Princess Berengaria of Navarre — a mellifluous name, a name from a fairy tale! — but her tale ended badly. She married King Richard the Lionheart in 1191, but the groom, it seems, was not inclined to the company of women. We cannot say this with certainty, and historians of different persuasions dispute the point, but Richard's coeur de lion may have beat more ardently for other men. As a matter of known record, his union with Berengaria produced no children nor any record of a pregnancy. They had their time together, and she accompanied her new husband part of the way on his voyage to Crusade in the Holy Land, perhaps an unusual honeymoon, but she never conceived a child, thus the idea held by some historians that the union was never consummated. Wounded in battle in 1199, he died in his mother's arms, not his wife's, which may tell us something. Queen Berengaria left no trace in the Plantagenet blood line and she was the only Queen of England who never set foot in her realm.

But another prince from her native land began the Bourbon lineage of France. King Henri III of Navarre joined his kingdom to the other when he became King Henri IV of France in 1589. His queen's three brothers had died in quick succession, leaving their throne vacant, and the Salic law demanded that only the closest male heir could inherit, an opportunity which Henri seized. Some warfare ensued, to be sure, but he made good his claim. It's a curious thing that one of the greatest kings of France began as a foreigner, and any gloire claimed by his successors had to recognize its debt to the Pyrenees mountains I cross this week.

Another monarch of sorts preceded me here, and this mountain pass still bears his name. Napoleon came this way and he was in a hurry, anxious to recover the failing campaign of French troops under the command of one of his less fortunate marshals. As the world knows, this did not end well. Napoleon's trumped-up imperium would have lasted far longer if he had kept his armies at home and spared them the disgrace — to say nothing of the slaughter — they met in Spain, and later in Russia. But it takes no philosopher-king to reach this conclusion: would have, could have, should have.

Well, it's extraordinary how one's thoughts can wander far afield as one's footsteps wander across another country. But I'm brought back to the present by the astonishing beauty of the scene before me, the rising road, the cloud-draped valleys promising rain and the promise kept. And then, the peak draws nearer and nearer still, until I am there, at the place I wished to reach ten years ago and finally reach today.

There's much to be said for goals not yet met and striving to meet them while we can. I very much dislike the expression "bucket list" not least because it's a cliché built on another before it, but also because it sets limits. Who can deny that a bucket has a bottom and indeed may have a leak where dreams may seep away? I prefer my wishes and undone deeds unlisted, in infinite numbers and, with each one done, I imagine the next.


